## What Families Need to Know Before and After a Loved One Enters Eternal Life

Before Death: What to Know and Do
Spiritual Support
Would your loved one like a visit from a priest or pastoral care visitor?
Would they like to receive the Sacrament of the Sick and Viaticum (Holy Communion for the journey)
Advance Care Planning
Does your loved one have an Advance Care Directive?  (A legal document outlining what medical care they consent to or refuse if they cannot speak for themselves.)
Have they prepared an Emergency Medical Information Package ("ICE" package)?  (Typically placed in a folder on the fridge for paramedics; includes medical info and care wishes.)
Is there a signed Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) order? (Without this form, paramedics must attempt resuscitation. Find the form here: www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/health/forms/302fil.pdf,
Important Documents to Locate
You will need to determine if there is a will or request a will search (through Vital Statistics)
<ul><li>Birth certificate, citizenship, or immigration documents</li><li>Marriage/divorce/separation papers</li></ul>
Funeral or service wishes
Financial records (e.g., bank, pension, mortgage)  House deed, vehicle registration
Life insurance policies

## When Death Occurs

- 1. When a loved one dies, a trained healthcare professional needs to verify the death.
- 2. If the death was unexpected, contact emergency services: 911
- 3. Contact a funeral home to collect the deceased person
  Make an appointment with someone at the funeral home.
  If no funeral home is involved, call Vital Statistics to register the death: 1-888-876-1633
- 4. If the person died in hospital:
- Call the hospital or care home to give them permission to release the body.
- 5. If it was the wish of the deceased person to have a church service, it is important to contact the parish office to inquire when the priest is available.

## **Expected Death at Home**

If death is expected, the physician can complete a Notification of Expected Death in the Home form: www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/health/forms/3987fil.pdf

This allows the body to be released to the funeral home without pronouncement of death.
